Are bumblebees and honeybees different?

Yes! There are lots of important differences between bumblebees and honeybees.

The table below tells you some more differences.

Bumblebee

Fat and furry.

24 different kinds of bumblebee in the UK.

Live in nests with 50-400 bees.

Only the queen sleeps through the winter in a hole in the ground.

Live in the wild, e.g. in our gardens.

Collect nectar from flowers to make a honey-like liquid to eat themselves.

Honeybee

Smaller and slim, like a wasp.

Only one kind of honeybee in all of Europe.

Live in hives of 50,000-60,000 bees!

The queen and many of her daughters sleep through the winter in their hive.

Most honeybees are looked after by bee-keepers, like pets.


Make lots of honey, which beekeepers take to feed to us.
