Mints (<i>Mentha spp.</i>)				July–Sept	My leaves are delicious in your food and drink. Mint tea, anyone?		
Bugle (<i>Ajuga reptans</i>)				April–May	I'm the 'bumblebee friendship plant' ! I grow extra 'mini plants' with their own roots – cut them off, pop in a pot, and gift to a friend if you like.		
Hardy geranium/ Cranesbill geranium (<i>Geranium spp.</i>)				April–Sept	As my name suggests, I'm very hard to kill! I can keep flowering until the first winter frost to give bumblebees lots to eat.		
Nasturtium (<i>Tropaeolum majus</i>) Pronounced 'nast-er-shum'				June–Sept	My seeds are big and fun to grow, especially with children . My trailing and dwarf varieties (like 'Tom Thumb') are also great for hanging baskets and small pots.

Bumblebees need lots of flowers to feed on. Give them a helping hand by adding just one of these bumblebee favourites to your outdoor space in March. It doesn't matter whether you have a garden, a window box or just a flower pot.

Our top picks are all easy to look after, and great for beginner gardeners. Simply wait for them to flower later this year, then enjoy watching your local bumblebees feeding!

Top tips:

- Wait until frosty mornings have stopped before you plant anything outdoors, or start growing plants indoors instead.
- Read the instruction label on your new plant or seeds for the best way to look after them.
- Always try to choose **organic, pesticide-free** plants and seeds – these are best for bumblebees.

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
